

Tribal Sub Plan: New Gujarat Pattern

New Gujarat Pattern was launched

To involve local tribal population in the process of formulation, planning and execution of development program suited to the local conditions and requirements

Discretionary funds

Placed at the disposal of the District Adijati Vikas Mandals and Taluka Development Committees

Sector wise funds devolved to the districts

Fund provided

For missing links, economic development and infrastructure creation

Features

- TSP budget allocation as per the tribal population in state.
- 20% of the outlay earmarked for Tribal Development Department and 80% for the Administrative Department.
- TDD communicates the breakup of outlay to the concerned Administrative Departments to TSP.
- 90% of the outlay earmarked for Tribal Development Department to be given to the district level and 10% at the State Level.
- **90% expenditure in ITDP areas and 10% outside ITDP areas.**











Children Benefitting from Supplementary Nutrition Program – State & ST




